Please accept this as a letter of comment and request for a public hearing on DEP #L-24251-TG-C-N, Casella/BGS' NRPA application.

For starters, I must register a complaint with the procedure in regard to this issue. Mr. Parker, we got an email from you on Aug. 7th announcing that the NRPA application had been accepted as complete for processing on July 31. The email also said that the general JRL Expansion application had been accepted as complete on Aug. 7. So the NRPA had been accepted for over a week before there was notification, and I know at least several JRL Advisory Committee members that were not notified in that email or otherwise. Your email contained a site to go to for more information, but when my wife went to that site on Aug. 14th looking for the NRPA application, it said "file not found".

In addition, Mr. John Banks of the Penobscot Nation told me that they had just received the NRPA papers yesterday, Aug. 17. Your email of Aug. 7 stated that the 20 day calendar for comments and requests would expire on Aug. 20 or 21. I'm not sure if the NRPA papers are online as of now. This series of events leaves the public with very little time to formulate intelligent fact-based comments on the NRPA application. I suggest that you recalculate the 20 day calendar of comment from the date the papers were actually available on your website, which would be no earlier that Aug. 17, 2015, with an expiration date of Sept. 6. "Complete for Processing" implies that the application is ready to share with the public, and this was not the case.

My interest in this matter include living within 1.75 miles of JRL on 120 acres largely comprised of forested wetlands. I am also a citizen of Maine and Old Town and have concerns about liability and costs involving JRL in the future. We never know when our lives will be interrupted by stifling odors or when we'll encounter flaming trash trucks en route to JRL, such as on May 11, 2015. We have a shallow well and contamination is a serious threat.

I also request a full adjudicatory Public Hearing on this specific matter, with ample time to discuss wetland issues if part of a public hearing on the larger expansion application. In addition, any hearing(s) should be held in the Old Town area for the convenience of those most effected. Aside from the Elk's Club in Old Town, there are large meeting places on Penobscot Nation land, and Happy Acres Hall could be available if need be several miles up Rt. 16 in Alton, which is also greatly impacted by JRL. Bear in mind that the overcrowded public information session staged by Casella/BGS included zero DEP representatives, which means that the general public has had no opportunity to ask questions of DEP staff but had to rely on Casella people for expansion process information. This is not acceptable, especially for a state-owned landfill.

Not having read the NRPA papers, I will make some general comments regarding the importance of protecting our wetlands. Wetlands serve as buffers and filters for surface water and groundwater, as well as providing opportunities for growth of micro-organisms, insects and amphibians that serve as vital building blocks for more complicated life forms, including endangered Penobscot River salmon as well as human beings. If the goal is to preserve vital wetlands, this NRPA permit and the Expansion should be denied. It is outrageous that acres of wetlands formerly set aside to be protected forever as part of the original mill landfill may now be filled and destroyed. The activities at JRL, including long-term low-level exposure to hydrogen sulfide gas, have adversely effected area wetlands and vital habitat. This is a very wet area, and all these wetlands are interconnected.

I look forward to hearing of an extended comment period on the NRPA application. You will find that if a public hearing is held in this area there are more wetland and wildlife experts per capita than anywhere else in New England willing to share their knowledge with DEP and the Public. Dear Michael Parker,

This is a request for a full adjudicatory Public hearing to consider the Casella/BGS application to expand the state-owned Juniper Ridge Landfill (JRL) in Old Town, Maine. This DEP solid waste license application #S-20700-WD-BI-N meets the criteria for the Board of Environmental Protection(BEP) to take jurisdiction but I decline that opportunity as I feel the Public will be better served if the Department, who are full time professional employees of the State, conducts a thorough, lengthy, and comprehensive hearing.

In Chapter 400 Rules section D: "Licensing Criteria for Solid Waste Facilities. The Department shall issue a license for a solid waste facility whenever it finds, based upon substantial evidence in the record, that the solid waste facility will not contaminate any water of the State, contaminate the ambient air, constitute a hazard to health or welfare, or create a nuisance." At the Hearing evidence will be presented that all of these requirements have either already been violated at JRL or will likely be at some point in the future. Erosion events have sent large amounts of soils into the surrounding wetlands, and a Casella expert has testified on the record that all landfills leak eventually. Methane releases have occurred and are continuing to happen despite large investments in landfill gas mitigation equipment.

It has been shown that long term exposure to hydrogen sulfide gas even at very low levels has a negative impact on health. Volatile organic compounds are also a threat not just to the workers but to the area residents. There is no denying that a flaming trash truck is a hazard to the health of those around it, as happened on May 11 of this year. As far as a threat to welfare, I think we can show that properties in the area of a landfill, as well as those along the haul routes, have less value than they would have without JRL there. My neighbor recently had his property sold until the buyer found out about the landfill, which is visible from his barn. It is difficult to deny the nuisance presented when certain truckloads of pungent wastes arrive, such as from the treatment plant at Rockland.

There should be concerns about Casella's technical advisors at JRL, which are the same ones who oversaw the building and operations at the current site while the Old Town mill was still owner. There was first a breach in the liner when it was being installed, and then a whole side of a cell slid down into a detention pond. More recently NEWSME had to rebuild a sedimentation pond (#5, I believe) when it became polluted. At a JRL Advisory Committee meeting held on Indian Island, they could not identify the exact source of the contamination, and tried to blame it on the mill landfill operators. This was their responsibility at that time. There is concern that due to the huge amounts of wastes being deposited and compacted by machines to save space the landfill may actually be sinking into the earth. This sounds preposterous to some, but land depressed by the glaciers of ten millennia ago is still rebounding. I did a rough calculation and the weight of mile-thick ice over an acre of ground is roughly equal to the weight put into JRL so far, and now they want to more than double the present amount.

There is a need for third-party expertise before any expansion is approved. There is very little monitoring of wastes into JRL, and we have to accept Casella's word as far as contents and the actual source, which was beyond our State borders for at least a third of it. Licensing criteria say "...based upon

substantial evidence in the record...", but if the evidence only includes numbers and findings of those on Casella's payroll, this record is incomplete. This is important because Chapter 400 rules on Recycling and Source Reduction mandate "...that the facility will be operated so that the volume of waste and the risks related to its handling and disposal have been reduced to the maximum practical extent by recycling and source reduction prior to disposal...". We need objective accounting right now. As President Reagan said, "Trust but verify." In addition to the waste streams, we are asked to accept as fact reports by Casella's contractors as far as endangered and threatened species that may be impacted by an expansion, as well as impacts to area wetlands. There should be surveys of all life forms in the landfill area by our state wildlife biologists. Recently Maine's DIF&W was consulted to ascertain the effects on bird and bat migration for an industrial wind project, and the result was a denial of a planned expansion. Since this is a State-owned facility, shouldn't all the State resources be used to verify the findings of those paid by the landfill operator?

Please add my voice to those others requesting that this Public Hearing be held in the Old town/Alton area. Although it may not be a part of the DEP evaluation process, remember that the creation of JRL was due to a highly leveraged threat of mill closure, which was ironic because a different mill owner had only a decade earlier threatened to shut down its operations if they did not get their own landfill. Casella made a lot of promises about delivering clean wood fuel from CDD which they failed to provide, as 16 of 31 fuel samples exceed state standards for contamination. It should be noted that a denial of this expansion of JRL would in effect end the State's experiment of landfill ownership with Casella as operator, which would be of great public benefit in my opinion.

The Penobscot Indian Nation (PIN) hereby requests that the Maine DEP hold a public hearing regarding the application by the State of Maine Bureau of General Services and NEWSME Landfill Operations, LLC (Application number S-20700-WD-BI-N) to expand the existing Juniper Ridge Landfill (JRL) located in Old Town. The PIN also requests that the public hearing be held at a location near the JRL so that maximum participation by the local community can be realized. To that end, The Penobscot Nation hereby offers its facilities at Indian Island as a site for the public hearing. We welcome the opportunity to work cooperatively with your agency in this regard.

The potential impacts to Penobscot Nation citizens, lands, and associated natural resources arising from the proposed expansion of the JRL are substantial. The Penobscot Nation enjoys traditional and cultural uses of the lands and natural resources surrounding the JRL, as our ancestors have for thousands of years. Many of the cultural activities practiced by our members are dependent on an ecologically healthy environment which may be adversely impacted by the proposed JRL expansion. As a result of the 1980 Maine Indian Land Claims Act, our tribes treaty-reserved hunting and fishing rights within the Penobscot Indian Reservation were reaffirmed, portions of which are located downslope from the JRL putting these important uses at risk. In addition to the potential direct negative environmental impacts associated with the proposed JRL expansion, the PIN may be adversely impacted by many ancillary activities and conditions incumbent in the development and operation of an expanded JRL. These would include, without limitation, things like increased truck traffic to and from the JRL, increased nuisance odors, and visual impacts that adversely impact the aesthetics of the region.

Sierra Club Maine hereby requests public hearings on the NRPA application for expansion of the Juniper Ridge Landfill DEP #L-24251-TG-C-N at locations and times that are accessible to the people who would be most impacted by the requested changes, like the people resident in such areas as Old Town, Orono, Alton, Penobscot Nation area, and the fishing communities along the Penobscot river basin. We represent 14,000 members and activists state wide with many residing along the Penobscot River.

We are deeply concerned that not only does this application require filling of more than two acres of existing wetlands but in addition will have, as noted in the application, impact on a significant vernal pool by digging within the state mandated 250 foot setback. While Casella Waster Systems, (also known as NEWSME) and Juniper Ridge Landfill may not have any interest in avoiding wetlands, the functions and values of those sites, particularly since there are so few registered vernal pools of significance in the state, require that the applicant and the DEP offer those of us who will be impacted a voice at the table. Vernal pools provide not only habitat for signal species but in addition serve to replenish aquifers upon which all species depend. Additional value of wetlands is the service they provide during episodes of significant rainfall. Climate Change predictions as well as existing experience indicates the need to preserve all the sponge effect we can of these valuable resources. Wetland destruction is one of the key causes of property damage during hurricanes, for instance.

Also, this landfill is located between two streams that drain directly into the Penobscot River. Given the efforts and expenditures of the State of Maine and other stakeholders to clean up the river as it serves as drinking water for many and as a resource rebounding in fisheries, not to mention the impact of further contamination down stream to Maine's iconic lobster fishery, it is incumbent upon the Department of Environmental Protection to enforce the Clean Water Act.and protect our largest river and its associated watershed.

I write to request that the Division of Solid Waste Management (DSWM) of the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) schedule at least one public hearing on the application shown above. The planned expansion of the Juniper Ridge Landfill (JRL) will have immediate, sustained, and long-lasting environmental impacts on the Old Town/Alton area. If approved and built, it will also impact the rest of our state.

A timely public meeting held at a location, date, and time that is convenient for the residents in the Old Town/Alton area is in the best interests of Maine residents, the applicant, and the DSWM because:

- JRL is located next to I-95, a major traffic route across the state residents, tourists, and commercial carriers use it heavily.
- Casella's original management agreement with the State stipulated that the JRL facility would handle waste *generated in Maine only*. However, shortly after getting their foot in the door, Casella worked to rewrite the definition of "in-state waste" and has been accepting waste generated from out of state almost since beginning operation.
- Casella Waste Management/NEWSME wants to expand JRL (a state-owned landfill and therefore taxpayer-supported) to a 74-acre site.
- The JRL expansion includes 54 acres for increased waste handling, filling in 2.04 acres of wetlands, and a completely new 20-acre industrial methane facility.
- The addition of a methane generation facility has public safety implications since methane is an explosive gas.
- At a public meeting on June 3, 2015, Casella spokesperson Don Meagher said they predicted approximately 700,000 TONS of waste per year for the next 10 12 years. That's an average of 1,918 tons/day...delivered by truck.
- Officials in Alton have asked for new on- and off-ramps to be built into I-95...a public investment that isn't cost-effective without the planned expansion of JRL.
- As a customer of Casella's I have an interest in seeing that the company operates in the best interests of its customers, the State of Maine, and long-term environmental protection.
- Casella/NEWSME is in financial difficulties and is looking for a buyer, according to local sources, and the terms of any sale may impact Casella's current contract to manage JRL.

People who live along the beautiful Penobscot enjoy it and depend on it as a drinking water source. They have a right to know that a major expansion of the JRL facility is being proposed that will impact public safety, the local environment, the economy, and the quality of life they have now.

Maine taxpayers need to be shown that:

- The DSWM is acting in the best interests of the citizens it was established to serve.
- Public information will be released and public input will be sought at every stage in the approval process.
- Expanding JRL will not result in more out-of-state waste coming in from New England and the Canadian provinces.
- If an expansion plan is approved, proper safety and environmental pollution controls are designed, built, and operated according to the appropriate State permit requirements.

I am writing in regard to Application #S-20700-WD-BI-N, the application by Casella Waste Management to expand the Juniper Ridge Landfill in Old Town/Alton. I request that a Public Hearing be held at a convenient location for local residents.

As a landowner within the Judkins Brook drainage, my property is already affected by odor and potential leaching/runoff from the Juniper Ridge Landfill given its current footprint. Casella Waste Management's assurance that our ground and surface waters are secure in perpetuity is of little comfort. The horizontal and vertical expansion of the landfill to the degree proposed will further degrade property values by increasing odor, creating a visual eyesore when the landfill becomes visible, and increasing already intolerable and unsafe truck traffic along Route 16. Route 16 already carries intense truck traffic from Juniper Ridge, gravel pits, and pulpwood operations delivering material to the Old Town Mill. Truck traffic at times can already exceed 1,000 passages a day, and is almost completely unpoliced, resulting in excessive and unsafe speeds. The addition of more truck traffic to Route 16 would be intolerable for Alton residents.

Many residents of Alton and nearby communities rightfully feel that our community and way of life are under constant assault between Juniper Ridge expansion proposals, the Argyle landfill/processing facility finally defeated last year, and on-again, off-again proposals related to the east-west highway corridor. In addition to these concerns, the re-definition of in-state waste to allow out-of-state waste to be landfilled clearly undermines the intent of the original agreement with Casella. In order to provide local residents an opportunity to comment on this application, I again request a Public Hearing be held at a location conducive to local participation.

I am requesting that the Department of Environmental Protection hold a public hearing on Casella's application # S-20700-WD-BI-N to drastically increase the existing state-owned Juniper Ridge landfill. I understand the plans include 54 acres for waste expansion, filling in a wetland and additional acreage for a new industrial methane facility.

We are waterfront land and homeowners in Harborside on Penobscot Bay. We have grave concerns about the expansion's threat to the water quality of the river that feeds into the Bay, which is already experiencing dramatic environmental impacts on its marine life. A recent study has shown that there are far greater leaks at facilities producing methane than previously thought. With methane being a potent greenhouse gas causing global climate disruption here and around the Earth, and leading to the rise in ocean acidification, both coastal and in deeper waters, that we are experiencing faster here in the Gulf of Maine than anywhere else in the world, it seems questionable to pursue this project.

As the protectors of our Maine's environment in a democratic society, you have a moral obligation to provide opportunities for the public and expert witnesses to speak to this issue. The Penobscot River is a natural treasure that draws not only tourists to the region who support local businesses along the River and the Bay, but it also is a source of water and food for many, including the Penobscot Nation. We should be focusing on how to make the River cleaner, not advancing businesses that threaten its water quality.

I hope I can count on the DEP to bring this matter to a public hearing in a timely manner before more development on this project takes place.

I am writing to request a Public Hearing regarding the Casella / BGS expansion application for the expansion of the Juniper Ridge Landfill (#S-20700-WD-BI-N). As a resident of Old Town, I have many concerns related to an expansion of the Landfill, and I know that many other Old Town residents are likewise concerned. A full adjudicatory Public Hearing would allow for an exchange of information and provide an opportunity for citizens to learn the details of the expansion request. It would thus be very helpful if the hearing were held in the Old Town area.

My major concerns are (but are not limited to):

There have been three trash truck fire events that were reported by the media this summer, in Newport, Brewer, and Old Town / Alton. At the Old Town / Alton fire, more than 60,000 gallons of water were used to douse the truck fire. This water, untreated, was allowed to drain directly into the ground surrounding the truck. The landfill is not supposed to contaminate the ground or water supply; logic requires that this condition apply to the trucks delivering trash to the landfill as well. To my knowledge, the ground in the vicinity of the fires has not been tested for contamination.

Wetlands set aside as "remediation" in the original landfill plan are proposed to be filled in during the expansion. How many times can these areas be moved, and what is the purpose of setting some lands aside from development if only to fill them in at a later date?

Penobscot County is already the final stop for much of Maine's (and much cleverly-disguised out-of-state waste), yet the State has no plans for other waste disposal sites. This leads one to believe that the proposed expansion of the Juniper Ridge Landfill is a done deal and that any public meetings or hearings are for show only. We know that the state will continue to produce some amounts of trash and it certainly appears that the state's plans for that trash are to send it to Old Town, regardless of the appropriateness of such plans.

The expansion application does not call for an increase in the disposal of Municipal Solid Waste, but a contract (signed 10/29/12) between Casella and PERC (Penobscot Energy Recovery) requires PERC to support the expansion application and states that the expansion "will allow municipal solid waste to be disposed at the Juniper Ridge Landfill".

The state has basically relied on Casella's self-reporting of operations at the landfill. There needs to be unbiased, unaffiliated third party observations and auditing of current landfill operations before there is any discussion of expansion at the landfill.

Thank you for your consideration with regard to a Public Hearing concerning the proposed expansion.
